What is US History I?



- United States History 1: The Founding Principles traces the development of the United States from colonization to the End of Reconstruction.
- The course is a ninth-grade Social Studies course mandated by the State Department of Public Instruction (SDPI) of Massachusetts and is required for graduation from any public high school in Massachusetts.
- There is a second part of the course, US History II, that the students will take in tenth grade.


